The final two Lunch & Learn events will take place on Friday, April 9th and Saturday, May 1st.






to the music and improvisation of jazz.

Meet RMG Board Member Ann Petit

Ann comes by her musical talents and interests naturally - she was reared in a family of musicians, and married a man with eleven siblings, all musicians. Wow! How could she go wrong?

Ann grew up in Iowa. Born in Waterloo, she was reared most of her life in Cresco. She started music training in piano at the age of six. She was

teaching students by the time she was in junior high school, and has continued to have a passion for the piano. "Pianos are my lifeline," she stated. Eventually moving to Rochester in 1993, Ann became a sales associate for the Hamilton Music Company. Later, she and her husband formed Petit Music, located in Eyota. They sell and service pianos, and restore vintage pianos. Ann continues to teach piano. She and her husband, Larry, have developed a keen interest in music history, and have traveled to Europe several times to pursue their interest.

Both of Ann's parents were teachers. Her father and uncle were both wonderful tenors, singing all their lives in church choirs and barbershop quartets. Her mother was an oboe player and a vocalist as well. Her twin brothers are vocalists, one sings in the La-Crosse Chamber Chorale, and the other is with the Choral Arts Ensemble in Rochester. Ann has also sung with that organiza-

Her husband's large family formed the Petit Swing Band, an organization that was well known around Minnesota and Iowa. The talent also extends to her children. Haley, their daughter, is currently studying Vocal Music Education at the University of Minnesota in Mankato, and son, Ethan, still in high school, loves percussion, and sings with the Honors Choir of Southeast Minnesota.

Ann credits much of her musical interest as well to Cresco, Iowa, a community of 4,500 people. The people and the school system have a dedication to the arts, including music and drama, her favorites. She appreciated opportunities offered in these areas due to her interests, plus the failure to "have an athletic bone in my body!" She played the bassoon in band, participated in the choir, studied voice and piano, and was involved in plays. She believes strongly that schools need to maintain programs in these areas, and fears that budget limitations cut too deeply into these programs.

For this reason, Ann and Larry have been strong supporters of cultural organizations, such as the Rochester Music Guild. Ann is pleased to serve on the Board of Directors, currently as cochair of the Garden of Note sale. With spring just around the corner, this will be a busy time for Ann as she will encourage everyone to purchase Garden of Note vouchers, and help support the many programs offered by the Rochester Music Guild.

There is an interesting twist to this story. Ann's first piano teacher in Cresco was Zoe Ann Abrahamson, always an inspiration to Ann. Apart for many years, they have now been reunited in Rochester after Zoe Ann and her husband moved to Rochester. The two remain close friends, and Ann states that Zoe's energy still guides and inspires her. A very happy ending to a wonderful story!

Scholarship Competition Winners

The 46th Annual Young Musicians Scholarship Competition was held February 5th and 6th, 2010 at First Presbyterian Church in Rochester and Petit Music in Eyota. Nearly ninety talented young musicians competed in four categories – piano, strings, voice, and wind instruments. This was also an historic year for the scholarship competition because we expanded to include junior divisions for piano, strings and voice. The students competed for \$5900 in scholarship money. Additional honorable mention (non-monetary) awards were presented in each division.

This year's judges were: Owen Lovell from UW Eau Claire – piano, David Carter from St. Olaf – strings, Deborah Carbaugh from Hamline University and Susan Druck from Augsburg College – vocal, and Matt Hafar from RCTC - winds. The judges were very impressed by the caliber of the students in the Rochester area.

The event was such a huge success because of the great support from community music teachers, generous donors, the members of the Rochester Music Guild, the Petit family for use of their store and beautiful pianos, and especially the many volunteers. I would personally like to thank Marilyn Riederer, DeAnn Spencer, and Jackie James for the many extra hours they gave to organizing the Competition.

The competition would not exist if it weren't for the very gracious support of those whose donations support the six divisions:

Carter Douglas was a gifted young pianist whose developing talent touched many in our community in her short life.

Georgia Daniel worked for over 22 years in the Rochester Public Schools, teaching students and directing school orchestras.

Sally Duffy, a two-time President of the Rochester Music Guild, sang with the Rochester Symphony Orchestra Chorale and had a passion for music and the arts.

Carl Schroedel, who served on both the Rochester Music Guild Board and the Rochester Orchestra and Chorale Board, was a performer himself as well as a dedicated supporter of the arts

Tom and Sue Spackman Family: a family of gifted musicians whose children participated in several music organizations in Rochester. Sue Spackman is a former president of the Rochester Music Guild

Dr. Howard and Peggy Andersen have been wonderful supporters of music in the Rochester community. Peggy Andersen taught piano lessons and has a great love for budding musicians.

The scholarships are funded from memorial funds established in these names, from funds donated by the Spackman and Andersen families, from Rochester Music Guild monies, and from the Judy and Jim Sloan Foundation. The first, second, and third place winners in the senior divisions and the first place winners of the junior divisions performed in a recital held Sunday, February 14, for a large audience of parents, Guild members, and friends, impressing all in attendance with their exceptional talents and musicianship.

Following the performances, award certificates and scholarship checks were presented to the winners. A reception in their honor concluded the event. We extend our hearty congratulations once again to the winners of this year's competition.

Gardens in the Rain by Claude Debussy. Chopin's Impromptu No. 1 in A-flat Major. Praeludium In G Major by Edvard Greig. Debussy's Deux Arabesques II. Marc Detective by Jason Sifford. And the list goes on. My name is Christina Hagan and I am a fifteen-year-old sophomore at Mayo High School. I live my life to the tunes of these songs. With an older and younger sister who both play the piano, the sound from the piano in our basement never ceases. While most teenagers bop around their house to the sound of rock music on their iPods, I brush my teeth to the strict rhythm of Bach and dust my room to the swing of my little sister Mary's jazz piece. And after waiting, and then waiting some more, I eventually get my turn to practice. After that, I turn the lights off until 3 p.m. the next day, when the vigorous piano playing cycle after school starts all over again.

I have been playing the piano for eight and a half years. I started in 2nd grade at Hoffman Madsen and enjoy competing in the Minnesota Music Teacher's Association Competition each year. In 2008, both of my sisters and I made the MMTA Honors Recital at the University of Minnesota as shown in the picture on the left It was an exciting experience for us all to be in it together.

Yet piano in our family did not start with me, my older sister, or even my mom. In fact, two of my great grandmothers were the pianists at their

church, and their daughters, my grandmothers, played the piano as well. My mom is also a great example for me as she has played the piano for church, weddings, recitals, and can sight-read any song I put in front of her. My older sister Bethany began taking lessons in 2nd grade and has been an excellent student from the start. When I was in second grade, I knew I had high expectations to meet. I was dying to play the piano as well as Bethany, which turned in my favor because in the Hagan family, piano is not an option. Five years later, Mary followed in my footsteps. In all of our minds, the piano is not just an instrument. It's a beautiful way to express ourselves and to share our passion for music.

I began preparing for the Rochester Music Guild Scholarship Competition last May. I knew that the competition would be stiff, so I practiced all summer and fall. As the time approached, I told myself two things. One, do your best. And two, have fun. Through playing the piano, singing, and playing tennis, I've learned many important things. Most imperative — always smile. A smile and determination can go a long way. Finally, February 6th arrived. I thought I would be nervous, but after a friendly smile from the judge put a smile on my face too, I was really at ease. Twenty minutes later, after greatly enjoying the audition and critiquing from the judge, I left knowing I had played my best. I was elated the next morning when I learned I had won first place. Later that day, I had a great time calling my piano teacher, Sue Leonard, and telling her the results of the competition. It was a wonderful experience.

I am so grateful for the scholarship I received and the opportunity to play at the Rochester Music Guild Scholarship Competition Recital several weeks ago. This experience is surely a highlight of my piano career. I hope that this competition will continue to run for many years so that other students can receive encouragement and confidence through the gifts of the Rochester Music Guild.
