Letter From Our President

As this 52nd year draws to a close, I am very happy to report that your Rochester Music Guild is thriving, with a great deal to celebrate. This past year RMG has been able to sustain, and indeed expand, high quality programs.

The annual **Scholarship Competition** was the largest ever with 82 contestant registrations, and some truly remarkable performances.

Lunch & Learn programs were terrific, with growing attendance.

A new Education Series was launched this spring providing young and old opportunities to both hear outstanding musicians, and then participate in a workshop setting. We were thrilled to have the Compass Rose Brass Ensemble, and a Woodwind Quintet from the Minnesota Orchestra help us launch these first programs.

Rochester Music Guild has provided support to nine area performance organizations in addition to the RSOC. The guild had the **financial resources** to make this possible. We had strong membership numbers, with record levels of member contributions. Excellent fund raising took place this past year with both the Spring and Fall fund raising events exceeding previous results.



Additional energy was put into pursuing **grant funding**. This proved successful. We are grateful, this past year, to be a recipient of grants from the South East Minnesota Arts Council, IBM and Community Education Citizen's Advisory Council.

We enjoy a large group of **committed volunteers** who make this all happen. The Guild has a talented, hard working board, including both long time and relatively new members, all focused to ensure the work of the Guild carried out successfully.

Over the past year a broader group of committee members, workers, and coordinators have cheerfully given their time and talents.

On behalf of the Guild Board, I thank each member for your continued support of the Guild's part in supporting our arts community in Rochester.

Education Report 2015-16

The guild has expanded its educational offerings this year to include two inaugural events aimed at young musicians, their teachers, professional musicians and hobbyists. This was offered in addition to our traditional Lunch and Learn programs, a total of 7 drew an average of 50 attendees. The guild is grateful to Carol Benson who joined us during the year, volunteering to coordinate meals for these programs. Additional appreciation goes out to Phillip and Kay Karsell who sponsored our Lunch & Learn program with Benjamin Gateno. The guild also wishes to recognize Rochester Community Education for awarding us a \$1000 CECAC grant to fund our April 30th event. Over 100 people were in the audience on April 10th for our first "educational event" featuring the Compass Rose Brass.

Meet Board Member April Horne

Garden of Note Co-chair!

April was born on Chanute AFB in Rantoul, IL. She attended the University of Illinois, receiving an undergraduate degree in engineering. She went onto the University of Minnesota for graduate school where she obtained a degree in business. Growing up she recalls that her parent were very frugal. However they made sure that their three children (April, another daughter and a son) all got music lessons. For April this played out to be piano lessons, followed by cello, then flute, then tuba. She participated in her school band and orchestra, besides singing in her high school choir. Graduation came with the gift of a guitar, from her parents, so she could take her music with her.

April came to Rochester after college graduation to work at IBM where she was employed for 20 years before transitioning to the Mayo Clinic. She is currently the Associate Director of Operations for the Mayo Clinic Neural Engineering Laboratories. After high school she no longer found herself participating in a musical group. Looking back she reflects that, could she live her life over again she would have done differently. "I would have kept music performance as part of my life." Things did change three years ago when she joined the Sweet Adelines.

Her sons were involved in music in high school, including participating in the Honors Choirs of SE MN. She strongly encouraged them to keep music in their lives after high school. Her oldest is currently working on his PhD in music theory. Her youngest has stayed active in his university choruses, while pursuing a PhD in biochemistry. Her husband appreciates music as well, having played cello in high school and college, and electric bass in a rock and roll band in college.

April loves the Sweet Adelines. "The harmonies give me Goosebumps. The ladies quickly became some of my best friends." She also is a member of "The Lady Slippers" quartet which has been visiting area high schools, this Spring, to encourage participation in "A Summer of Harmony" for 8-12th grade girls. April is program director for the SE MN a Cappella festival, held the first weekend of November. Over 300 singers from 7-10 high school choirs, a couple college choirs, and a community and professional choirs participate. (visit www.SEMNaCappella.org for more on the visits & festival) April also established the Dover Eyota Music Association.

April describes herself as an "a-cappella-holic", with related activities including travel to Washington DC, Oregon, California, Tennessee, and Chicago to attend various festivals. April remains amazed by what a positive effect the performance of music had on my life and now can't imagine life without a healthy portion of music. She strives to encourage all young people to not give up music performance after high school; to understand that their lives will be richer, regardless of their chosen profession, if they maintain an active musical life.

Meet Board Member Nancy Slocumb

Outgoing coordinator of ushers

Nancy is a born and raised "Rochestersite." She and her sibs (her mother, as well) were all born here at Saint Marys Hospital. I played piano, not very well, in spite of lessons from Orvis Ross and the violin somewhat better. I enjoyed playing in school orchestras. My mother played viola in the Rochester Symphony for many years. She grew up hearing a lot of classical music from my mother's collection as well as her string quartet, when they practiced at home. Her siblings (all older) brought home folk and a lot of jazz.

Graduating from public education came at John Marshall "In a class of 724" Nancy is quick to add. Though never receiving a BA, she went on to study in a variety of areas: music theory and harmony, marine ecology for scuba divers, group & individual counseling, Ham radio, celestial navigation, clinical neurophysiology technology, and clinical research coordination.

Over the years she maintained her interest in music, especially through the specialties of the places I lived. The jazz night clubs of San Francisco with a DJ from KJAZ radio, Janis Joplin was across the hall for a while, Hawaiian slack key guitar beats Don Ho any evening (since he serenaded the shop where she worked in Waikiki – "Aaaack"). She still listens to Mexican radio from time to time.

She spent 16 years living on a sailboat most of it at anchor in Mexico and Central America. Unfortunately, there wasn't much room for instruments. Following the death of her husband from brain cancer, she returned to Rochester in 1994 to spend time with my 90+ father. She went to work at, and retired from, Mayo Clinic, ushered for the symphony, and played percussion with a small salsa group for Alzheimer's patients.

She worked part time at the Co-op and SNG Research before having hip tendon surgery this past January and recuperating ever since. She graduated from a body cast (a 6 week ordeal) to a single crutch as of just this week (April 25), so she is slowly but surely making her way back to more activity. Though her schedule didn't allow her to attend board meetings, she was faithful recruiting and coordinating ushers for RSOC concerts.


