President's Notes



As we look toward the future for our 2007-2008 season, I wish to reflect briefly upon our recent past. Last season

was a year of loss and a year of growth. In 2006-2007 the Guild suffered the loss of two cherished Board members, Ruth Vigness and the Reverend Carl Schroedel. Ruth for many years coordinated our *Lunch & Learn* program, while Carl, a longtime music supporter, was just beginning his term as a Member-at-Large. Their dedication to our music community will long be remembered.

The 2006-2007 season was also one of growth and development. Our membership experienced an increase of nearly 10%, with Membership Chair, Kay Weaver, reporting a total of 197 individuals. Our fundraisers, under the leadership of Gay Segar (Herberger's Community Days), Carla Nelson and Barbara Eakins (Garden of Note), and Sylvia Swede (Publications), provided a firm financial foundation to enable us to achieve our mission. Our scholarship program, under the direction of Jackie James and Chris Parisi, allowed us to honor 17 outstanding young musicians with awards totalling \$4,900.

The Rochester Music Guild's mission is to promote and enhance music enrichment within our community. We are, indeed, a service-oriented organization, and it is on the strength of our volunteers that we achieve this mission. Last year, under the direction of Faye Waldo, we provided ushers for

each of the Rochester Symphony Orchestra and Chorale concerts. Our membership provided volunteers for the RSOC's outreach programs of HoNk*SqUeAk* ScRaTcH*BoOm, Radiothon, various receptions, and the Garden Fanfare financial appeal. Our *Lunch & Learn* programs provided a myriad of experiences ranging from Maestro Lantz's always insightful and entertaining concert previews to Carolyn Mead's instructive presentation on the philosophy and technique of the Suzuki Method of teaching, to Jan Matson's enlightening journey towards a holistic approach to music.

Our Arts Advocate, Pauline Krieger, kept us abreast of current national and community art legislation and information, while Historian Pauline Utzinger provided Gracious Gestures to our membership and kept us in touch with our rich past. And, finally, our Publications Editor, Joyce Lewis, took on the monumental job of creating our *Bravo!* newsletters which provide a marvelous mechanism for disseminating Guild information to our membership.

A strong organization requires a strong leadership base. In 2006-2007 we indeed had a solid group of workers providing this foundation. Our Secretary, Jean Gutschenritter, dutifully recorded all of our minutes while Treasurer, Glenn VanLaningham, did an outstanding job of keeping us both fiscally responsible and well-informed.

My final reflection on the past is to thank two extremely dedicated and hard-working women in the organization, outgoing Past President, Ella VanLan-

ingham, and outgoing President, Majel Ann Hall. I am deeply grateful for the wonderful assistance of these two individuals. Ella has been a tireless worker for this organization for a number of years and her insights concerning past and future directions for the Guild have been invaluable. And finally, Majel, who demonstrated an amazing flexibility towards leadership and service when dealing with unexpected situations such as the deaths of our board members and the November storm which caused the cancellation of our Membership Social. But perhaps I am most grateful for her cheerful willingness to step in and organize the successful Annual Meeting last May when I was unable to fulfill my responsibilities in that capacity due to prior family commitments. Her understanding and patience were greatly appreciated. I look forward to her continued leadership in the role of Past-President during this coming year.

And now to the future. In addition to those acknowledged above, with the exception of retiring members Pauline Utzinger, Sylvia Swede, and Ella VanLaningham (who will serve in an unofficial capacity as assistant to the Treasurer), the 2007-2008 year welcomes an outstanding group of individuals to our board. New to the board are Co-Historians--Judy and Jim Sloan, *Lunch & Learn* Chair--Jeff Webster, Member-at-Large (Book Sales)--Naomi Atrubin, Member-at-Large (Volunteers)--Judy Webster, Ushers--Nancy Slocumb, and Webmaster--Rick Kiscaden.

My personal goals for this organization include increasing our membership base and visibility in the community while continuing to provide the exceptional support for music appreciation, education, and performance for which the Guild is well known. As members of the Guild, you can help me achieve these goals by encouraging others to join us in our mission. Thank you all for being part of a group of music lovers and volunteers who touch the hearts and minds of others through music.

2007 Senior Scholarship Awards

Each spring, the Rochester Music Guild awards a \$100 scholarship to a senior at each of Rochester's three public high schools. The students, recognized for musical excellence and dedication, are selected by the music faculty at each school.

Two of the awards are given in memory of Sid Suddendorf, a long-time music consultant for the Rochester School District. This year's Suddendorf scholarship award winners were Courtney Gill (John Marshall High School) and Coral Graszer (Mayo High School).

The Rochester Music Guild funds a third equal scholarship for a senior at Century High School and this year Lucy Oehler received that award. All the scholarships were presented to the students at Senior Award ceremonies this past May.

2008 Scholarship Competition

The 44th annual RMG Young Musicians Scholarship Competition will be held Saturday, February 2, 2008, at First Presbyterian Church in Rochester. The Rochester Music Guild will award a total of \$4800 in scholarships to winners in four divisions – piano, string instruments, wind instruments, and voice. Students in grades 8-12 who live within a 50-mile radius of Rochester are eligible to compete. A scholarship brochure with all the details and a registration form will be mailed to area music teachers and made available at Rochester music stores, the Rochester Symphony Orchestra office, and student music organizations by early November. The brochure and registration form will also be available on the Music Guild's website (rochestermusicguild.org). A winners' recital will be held Sunday, February 17, 2008, at 2:00 pm at First Presbyterian Church.

Rochester Symphony & Chorale "Piping Hot!"

Two years ago the Rochester Symphony Chorale launched a season extra, "Piping Hot," built around The King of Instruments, as Mozart dubbed the pipe organ. "Piping Hot" features the imposing organ at the Church of St. John, as well as the Rochester Chorale and local choir members. The new tradition returns at 7:30 p.m. Oct. 27 in the Church of St. John, 11 Fourth Ave. S.W., Rochester.

The Church of St. John actually has two pipe organs, an antiphonal organ located at the back of the church and the main pipe organ. Built in 1938 by Wicks Organ Co. of Highland, Illinois, the antiphonal organ was one of the first organs built under the supervision of Henry Willis III, son of the famous English organ builder. The main pipe organ was built in 2002 by Rieger-Kloss of the Czech Republic. Rieger-Kloss has been building organs since the mid-19th century and is the largest organ builder in the world today.

Among the selections will be Mendelssohn's "Grant Us Thy Peace" and a new hymn, "The Gift," by Minnesota composer David Evan Thomas and Twin City organist/writer Marilyn Biery. The meditative "Lumen de lumine" by former Rochester organist/composer Gerald Near will be complemented by the dynamic choral fanfare "Dazzling as the Sun" by New Englander Gweneth Walker.

Two popular hymns, "Sweet Hour of Prayer" and "How Firm a Foundation," will be wrapped in new trimmings. Solo organists from the Southeastern Minnesota chapter of the American Guild of Organists will provide their own gifts of music seated at The King of Instruments at St. John's.

Naomi Atrubin *Canadian Transplant*



Born and reared in Winnipeg, Manitoba, Naomi continues to look back with fondness on her years on the prairie. Her loyalty to Canada has never diminished. In school she developed an early interest in music from first grade, eventually completing the prestigious Toronto Conservatory exams with honors in piano. She also excelled in many sports – track and volleyball being among her specialties.

Not long after high school graduation, Naomi's father died, and the family relocated to California where she attended school at Berkeley, receiving a degree in English. She taught for several years in Los Angeles schools before returning to study for a degree in nursing from the Columbia University. Nursing became her lifetime career, but was interrupted for a number of years devoted to child rearing. She and her husband, Alan, had three children.

A transfer of her husband, an engineer, brought the family to Rochester (IBM: "I've Been Moved") in September 1962. Continuing her full-time responsibilities in child rearing, Naomi became a "hockey mom" for her son who eventually played on several semi-pro teams in the USA and in Europe. She also became very involved in community activities, being on the Community Concert Board and assisting the Minnesota Symphony during the years it performed in Rochester. She eventually was able to return to her nursing career. She has one daughter living in the Twin Cities and one in New York, in addition to her son, who lives in Florida.

Participation in sports has always remained a significant part of Naomi's life. Tennis and running were always important to her. She has participated in both 5K and 10 K events. Eventually some health issues restricted some of her activity. Playing bridge has now become her passion – she is a regular at duplicate events locally and some district tournaments. She participates in other local bridge clubs and is currently in three book clubs – reading being another of her favorite pastimes.

Naomi joined the Rochester Music Guild Board in July of this year. She has taken on the responsibility of sales projects for the organization. Not a new face



No one in Rochester needs an introduction to Carla Nelson, well known to all of us from her three campaigns for the District 30A seat in the Minnesota House of Representatives. And Rochester music lovers remember her as the winner of last spring's First Annual Aspiring Conductor contest!

Carla was born and grew up in Iowa, the daughter of a high school principal and an elementary school teacher. She attended Indianola High School, the University of Northern Iowa, and Drake University. With a degree in education, Carla taught school in Iowa, married, and started a family. She and her husband, a financial planner, chose to relocate to Rochester because it's such a great place to raise a family. They moved here in 1983 with their first son, Jeremiah; and soon added two more sons, Joshua and Jonathan, to the family. Eventually Carla returned to the classroom in Rochester at Holmes Elementary School, and went on to Willow Creek Middle School as a reading teacher. She earned a master's degree in Education Teacher Leadership before leaving the field of education for the Minnesota legislature. She continued working on education issues in the state capital, serving on committees for both K-12 and higher education. Carla now owns and operates her own Allstate Insurance Agency out on West Circle Drive.

Carla's oldest son, Jeremiah, now grown, is a professional singer and songwriter, teaching and performing guitar and other strings. Middle son Joshua is studying public recreation at South Dakota State University, and the youngest son, Jonathan, is also at SDSU studying engineering.

Carla's interest in music goes back to her high school days playing clarinet in the band, and continued when she was selected as a member of America's Youth in Concert, a national concert band. For Carla, the highlight of the band's European tour was when they played in the Cathedral of Notre Dame in Paris. Moving on to college, she joined the University of Northern Iowa Wind Ensemble as the only non-music major in the group. In addition to the clarinet, Carla plays piano and played in the pit orchestra for community theatre productions of Music Man, West Side Story, and My Fair Lady. Carla admits that she doesn't play her clarinet much these days but she continues to be active as a performer by singing in the Rochester Chorale for the past eight years. She has been a member of the Rochester Music Guild board for the past three years, working with Barbara Eakins to organize and coordinate the Garden of Note Sale, our biggest fundraiser. We look forward to another successful sale next spring!

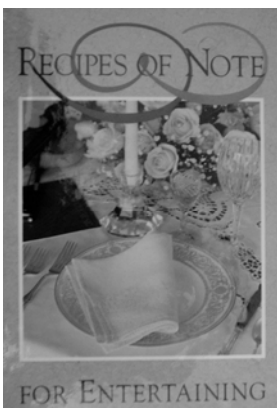

Three-Cheese Spinach Frittata
from *Recipes of Note for Entertaining*, page 174

- 1/4 cup olive oil
- 1 (10-oz) package frozen chopped spinach, thawed and well drained
- 8 oz fresh mushrooms, sliced
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 6 eggs, lightly beaten
- 3/4 cup shredded provolone cheese
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 3/4 tsp dried Italian seasoning
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 4 oz shredded mozzarella cheese
- 1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese

In a large skillet, heat olive oil until a light haze forms. Add spinach, mushrooms and onion. Cook and stir until onion is transparent. Remove from heat. Add eggs, provolone cheese, garlic and seasonings; mix well. Spoon into a greased 9-inch pie plate. Sprinkle with mozzarella cheese and Parmesan cheese. Bake at 350° for 25 minutes until set.

There is no performance fee. A basket for donations will be displayed at each event. Please consider a donation to keep our expenses as low as possible.

Teachers may register two students for each program by mail, phone, or e-mail. You need not be a member of one of the sponsoring organizations to present a student. We wish to include as many teachers and students as possible from all around our area.

Registration must include the student's name, a complete description of the piece to be performed, contact information, and the name of the school that the student attends.
